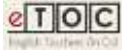

#### 4 SUMMER JOBS

5 It has long been a tradition for American high school students to spend their  
 6 summer vacation working.

7 As well as being a chance to earn money, the summer job has generally been  
 8 regarded as an important step in the growing up process because it teaches  
 9 responsibility and interpersonal skills.

10 ( 29 ), changes in both young people's attitudes and the labor market have  
 11 strongly impacted the number of teens employed during the summer.

12 Today, approximately one-third of teens have summer jobs-a figure that is  
 13 roughly half what it was just four decades ago.

26 The Bureau of Labor Statistics found that in the last 2 years, the number of  
 27 16-to-19-year-olds enrolled in summer school has tripled.

28 As college degrees have become essential for career success and tuition fees  
 29 continue to rise, many students have realized that taking advanced classes  
 30 during the summer to win scholarships can be more beneficial than working  
 31 at a minimum-wage job.

37 Another factor behind the decreasing popularity of summer jobs may be  
 38 ( 31 ). Recently, many teenagers have been choosing to do unpaid  
 39 internships during the summer.

40 As older adults are remaining in the workforce longer than ever, many young  
 41 graduates have been losing out to these more experienced applicants even for  
 42 entry-level positions. Consequently, the chance to acquire career-specific  
 43 skills have become more appealing. With the US economy strengthening,  
 44 however, the traditional summer job could begin to make a comeback.
